The Local Area Agreements (LAAs) prospectus was launched on 27 July 2004. LAAs represent, in the Government's words, "a radical new approach to improve the co-ordination between central government and local authorities and their partners, working through local strategic partnerships". Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council was selected as one of the 21 pilots announced on the 4 th October 2004 and are now in the second year of our three year agreement, which runs to March 2008, with an annual update process built in.					
Stockton's LAA is organised around four performance blocks. Until March 2006 this structure was set by Central Government, but in March 2006 Stockton Council gained additional freedom as a 'single pot' LAA. This means that we have been able to realign our performance monitoring approach to match our 5 Community Strategy outcome areas rather than sticking					

to the original LAA block structure. The review document circulated to Stockton Renaissance for consideration by the Board, sets out a summary of performance in the 5 Community Strategy outcome areas, and a summary of progress on partnership governance and on financial and performance management. It also sets out the principle benefits of the LAA approach over the last six months and key development issues for the future. The LAA will be reviewed in early 2007, and a discussion of priorities for the next agreement update is planned for the Annual Renaissance event to be held 9 th January 2007.
