DPD3: YARM AND EAGLESCLIFFE AREA ACTION PLAN DEVELOPMENT PLAN DOCUMENT ISSUES AND OPTIONS CONSULTATION.

1. Summary

This report presents to Members the Yarm and Eaglescliffe Area Action Plan DPD Issues and Options Paper (Appendix 1). The DPD is intended to give an overview of existing plans and proposals for the Yarm and Eaglescliffe areas, to incorporate them into an action plan, to identify a vision of how the area should develop in the future and to develop policies to guide future development in the area.

The DPD has been subject to a Sustainability Appraisal (SA) scoping exercise and the Scoping Report is attached at Appendix 2. This establishes the sustainability issues relevant to this DPD and sets out a framework consisting of objectives, indicators and targets to test how the plan will contribute to sustainable development. It is published alongside the DPD for public consultation.

2. Recommendations

It is recommended that Cabinet:

- i) Notes the contents of this report,
- ii) Agrees the Yarm and Eaglescliffe Area Action Plan Issues and Options DPD for public consultation,
- iii) Delegates to officers, in consultation with the LDF Member Steering Group, any necessary minor amendments prior to the publication of the document for public consultation.

3. Reasons for the Recommendations/Decision(s)

There are pressures in the Yarm and Eaglescliffe area that are being addressed by a range of organisations including the Council, Town Council and Government Agencies, and within these organisations there are numerous departments dealing with different projects. It is intended that the Y&EAAP will coordinate these various plans and strategies to assist in their delivery. In addition, the YEAAP may also identify other issues such as

development opportunities, highway improvement opportunities or policy gaps that may require filling.

The Issues and Options consultation paper asks probing questions to generate discussion and ideas for solutions. It also allows for proposals for other issues and possible development options.

4. Status of the DPD

The Y&EAPP forms part of the Local Development Framework as a Development Plan Document, it carries weight as a policy document. Area Action Plans (AAP) have a broader scope than other DPDs in that, in addition to policy, they can include they can include additional detail normally reserved for Supplementary Planning Documents.

The Y&EAAP must be map-based with defined boundaries. The Local Development Scheme states that the AAP must cover the built up area of Yarm and Eaglescliffe (which also includes Egglescliffe and Preston).

6. Members Interests

Members (including co-opted members with voting rights) should consider whether they have a personal interest in the item as defined in the Council's code of conduct (paragraph 8) and, if so, declare the existence and nature of that interest in accordance with paragraph 9 of the code.

A Member with a prejudicial interest in any matter must withdraw from the room where the meeting is being held, whilst the matter is being considered; not exercise executive functions in relation to the matter and not seek improperly to influence the decision about the matter (paragraph 12 of the Code).

Further to the above, it should be noted that any Member attending a meeting of Cabinet, Select Committee etc.; whether or not they are a member of the Cabinet or Select Committee concerned, must declare any personal interest which they have in the business being considered at the meeting, and if their interest is prejudicial, they must also leave the meeting room during consideration of the relevant item.

1. <u>Summary</u>

This report presents to Members the Yarm and Eaglescliffe Area Action Plan DPD Issues and Options Paper (Appendix 1). The DPD is intended to give an overview of existing plans and proposals for the Yarm and Eaglescliffe areas, to incorporate them into an action plan, to identify a vision of how the area should develop in the future and to develop policies to guide future development in the area.

The DPD has been subject to a Sustainability Appraisal (SA) scoping exercise and the Scoping Report is attached at Appendix 2. This establishes the sustainability issues relevant to this DPD and sets out a framework consisting of objectives, indicators and targets to test how the plan will contribute to sustainable development. It is published alongside the DPD for public consultation.

DETAIL

3 Background

There are pressures in the Yarm and Eaglescliffe area that are being addressed by a range of organisations including the Council, Town Council and Government Agencies, and within these organisations there are numerous departments dealing with different projects. It is intended that the Y&EAAP will coordinate these various plans and strategies to assist in their delivery. In addition, the Y&EAPP may also

identify other issues such as development opportunities, highway improvement opportunities or policy gaps that may require filling.

The Local Development Scheme describes the Y&EAAP as:

"The preparation of an Area Action Plans to address the key pressures / development opportunities within Yarm and Eaglescliffe. Will include a series of co-ordinated proposals for traffic management and parking, future redevelopment opportunities and planning obligations."

A number of key issues have emerged from consultation with officers and discussions with local residents and Town and Parish Councillors that could be addressed through the DPD. These are:

- Major schemes in the pipeline
- Tourism and visitor facilities
- Maintaining and enhancing the residential areas
- Strengthening Yarm's role as a commercial centre
- Protection of the historic areas
- Traffic and parking
- Green spaces
- Potential development sites

Within these key themes, the Issues and Options consultation paper asks probing questions to generate discussion and ideas for solutions. It also allows for proposals for other issues and possible development options.

A pre-consultation event with key stakeholders was held on 22nd May 2007. Those invited included representatives from EPAG, Yarm Residents Group, Town and Parish Councillors and Ward Councillors. The comments made at the meeting have been incorporated into the attached Issues and Options paper, where possible.

4. Status of the DPD

The Y&EAPP forms part of the Local Development Framework. As a Development Plan Document (DPD), it carries weight as a Policy document. Action Area Plans (AAP) have a broader scope than other DPDs in that, in addition to policy, they can include additional detail normally reserved for Supplementary Planning Documents.

The AAP should not repeat existing Local Development Framework policy and advice documents (including National guidance in the form of PPG and PPS), nor must it conflict with any of these policies or guidance. However it may develop further any existing policies or guidance, or introduce additional policies or guidance at a more local level. The AAP may also allocate sites for development or identify sites to be protected from development. It may include management plans for existing sites or areas.

The Y&EAAP must be map-based with defined boundaries. It must not be conceptual or take a general approach. It must be specific to the

area or a site. The Local Development Scheme states that the AAP must cover the built up area of Yarm and Eaglescliffe (which also includes Egglescliffe and Preston).

The basic milestones for preparation and Adoption are set out in the Local Development Scheme, reproduced below;

6. Following the Issues and Options paper, Preferred Options will be developed, which takes into account the comments from this consultation. Further consultation will take place, and if there are objections an independent Inquiry will be held to consider the objections. The findings of that Inquiry will be binding on the Council. If there are no objections and therefore no Inquiry, the DPD can be adopted immediately.

Those invited include representatives from EPAG, Yarm Residents Group, Town and Parish Councillors and Ward Councillors. The comments made at this meeting have been incorporated, as far as possible, into this document.

RISK ANALYSIS

- 11. It is considered that there is no significant risk associated with the adoption of the Yarm and Eaglescliffe Area Action Plan as upon adoption it cannot be challenged through the planning process, although a legal challenge is possible within three months of adoption.
- 12. Conversely, if the Council does not adopt the Yarm and Eaglescliffe Area Action Plan it may weaken in its stance in refusing any inappropriate planning applications.
