Since February 2007, a programme of consultation has been undertaken to present, seek comments and contribute towards the vision for the regeneration of the town centre and an Action Plan for the

The overall responses from the		
consultation were supportive of the six key		
sites identified as the focus of the Action		
Plan for the regeneration of the town		
centre and riverside. These sites included		
the Northern Gateway, Riverside Sides,		
Southern Gateway, Townscape Heritage		
sites, Boathouse Lane and the Eastern		
Gateway (including North Shore).		
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One of the common themes throughout		
the comments received was the concern		
that there were not enough proposals for		
the regeneration of the High Street itself.		
Many were supportive of the gateway and		
riverside proposals and people requested		
changes to the quality and mix of the retail		
offer in the High Street. Requests for		
improvements to the public realm and		
market provision were also received. It		
was proposed that whilst all efforts will		
continue to be made to being in high		
quality retailers, additional development		
opportunities need to be identified through		
the Action Plan and Local Development		
Framework.		

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Another common theme were issues			
relating transport and infrastructure in the			
town centre.			
The proposals for the food store on the			
Southern Gateway was supported, with			
people welcoming the new visitors to the			
town this could bring. Some, however,			
raised concerns over the potential impact			
that this could have on other High Street			
retailers. The Globe Theatre was an			
extremely popular proposal, and the need			
for improvements to Norton Road, as part			
of the Northern Gateway, was particularly			
welcomed.			
Strong support was received for the			
development of a café culture, with street			
cafes proposed to maximise use of the			
wide High Street and creating activity on			
non market days.			
Calls for improvements to the street			
market have been met with the re-launch			
of the new-look market taking place in			
September 2007.			
The need to celebrate the towns' heritage			
was noted, and subject to feasibility will be			
included within future reviews of the			
Action Plan.			
The Action Plan is currently being			
amended to take into account the public			
comments received, as well as a number

<ul> <li>Destination Sites – well-equipped play areas within parks, which serve a large catchment area and offer a good range of supporting facilities such as toilets and refreshments.</li> <li>Neighbourhood Sites – again, well-equipped areas within parks, but with fewer supporting facilities.</li> <li>Doorstep Sites – smaller, standalone play areas, which have a limited range of equipment and serve a local catchment area.</li> <li>The Strategy covers a relatively short time period: 2007-10. This reflects:</li> </ul>		
- A medium term aspiration to incorporate the key elements of the Play Area Strategy into a single Borough Play Strategy, subject to the approval of Cabinet, the Children's Trust Board and the proposed 'Play Partnership' and;		
- A need to produce a more detailed 'Play Area Action Plan' upon completion of the Council's Open Space Audit. The next stage in this process will be to undertake		

a full assessment of local needs and expectations in terms of the provision of open spaces across the Borough, including play areas. This work will be complete by May 2008 and will form an essential step in the process of setting local standards for the provision of play areas and other types of open space (e.g. a minimum of one Destination Site to be within X km of every household in the Borough, or per X no population).  The final version of this document will be made available to the public, and the Council will consult locally on the implementation of any specific proposals.
