Building Schools for the Future Secondary Education Consultation November 2007

Summary of an analysis and report by NWA Social & Market Research

INTRODUCTION

1. Introduction and Methodology

- 1.1 Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council expects to receive around £150 million for transforming secondary education through the Government's Building Schools for the Future (BSF) initiative. Work with secondary headteachers, college principals and other partners led to a set of possible options for school organisation for general consultation.
- 1.2 A brochure under the title of Future Learning was designed and published by the Council for distribution at the end of October 2007. 100,000 brochures were printed with 77,000 copies being distributed to households in the Borough and the rest placed in schools, libraries, doctors' surgeries and other public buildings. The brochure was also made available on the Council website.
- 1.3 Included within the brochure was a questionnaire in the form of a 4-page pullout for completion and freepost transmission to NWA Social & Market Research. NWA's role was to enter the data, analyse and report the results. The questionnaire offered 2 options to residents in each of the four integrated service areas (North Stockton, Central Stockton, South of the Borough and Billingham). Respondents were invited to comment on each of the options and to offer options of their own. In addition to the postal survey the questionnaire was available to complete and return on-line.
- 1.4 The questionnaire was designed by NWA in collaboration with the client, so as to best meet their specific needs. In addition to the information detailed above on the options, data was also collected in relation to:
 - The respondent's postcode
 - any connection with a school (Pupil/ Parent or carer/ Staff member/ Governor)
 - further comments about the suggested options or any new options
- 1.5 All responses with a valid postcode were analysed. This includes a large number of proforma sheets, which were derivatives of the official questionnaire with options and comments for the North Stockton area already completed.

2. Achieved Response

- 2.1 In total 3882 responses were received. These were in the following formats:
 - 697 by e-mail from the on-line questionnaire
 - 1160 'proforma' sheets
 - 2025 questionnaires
- 2.2 Statements were received from the governing bodies of The Norton School, Ian Ramsey Church of England School, Northfield School, and Egglescliffe School. College; and from Egglescliffe Parish Council, Ingleby Barwick Town Council, and the Corner House Youth Project, as well as from a number of individuals.

MAIN FINDINGS

1. South of the Borough Options

Option A - One new School in Thornaby and three Schools for Yarm, Eaglescliffe and Ingleby Barwick

- Close Thornaby Community School and St Patrick's School. Replace them with one new school for 1,400 students. The new school might be a Voluntary Aided School, a Foundation School, a Community School or an Academy, depending on the result of the competition.
- Refurbish Conyers School for 1,200 students (plus 300 sixth form places).
- Replace Egglescliffe School with a new building on the site of its sports fields at Allens West (1,200 students) and a sixth form block on its current site (300 students).
- Keep All Saints School at its current size (600).

Option B - Two new Schools in Thornaby and three Schools for Yarm, Eaglescliffe and Ingleby Barwick

- Keep Thornaby Community School and St Patrick's School as separate schools in a shared building for 1,400 students.
- Refurbish Conyers School for 1,200 students (plus 300 sixth form places).
- Replace Egglescliffe School with a new building on the site of its sports fields at Allens West (1,200 students) and a sixth form block on its current site (300 students).
- Keep All Saints School at its current size (600).
- 1.1 1256 respondents completed this part of the questionnaire. The following table sets out the number and percentage that gave each response.
