Joint Waste Management Strategy - Implementation Plan

Overview:

To set out our commitment to meet the agreed policies and actions set out in the Tees Valley Joint Waste Management Strategy. The main focus for this implementation plan will be for the short and medium term commitments but will also identify longer-term commitments where possible.

Short Term – these will set out planned actions until 2009 Medium Term - these will set out planned actions between 2010 and 2012 Long Term – these will set out planned actions beyond 2012

Key Objectives

- 1: **Joint Working –** We will continue to work together in partnership with other stakeholders in order to ensure sustainable waste management within the Tees Valley. We will strive for sub-regional self- sufficiency and be mindful of the proximity principal.
- 2: Sustainable Waste Management We will work to ensure that the services delivered by the Tees Valley Authorities implement methods of sustainable waste management in line with the Waste Hierarchy.
- **3: Waste Awareness and Minimisation –** We will aim to promote waste awareness and minimisation and encourage householders, schools and local businesses to consider the impact of their behaviour with regards to their waste stream. We will jointly aim towards limiting the waste growth rate as agreed in the Regional Spatial Strategy.
- **4:** Recycling and Composting We will work towards increasing the proportion of material that is collected for recycling and composting through kerbside schemes, bring sites and Household Waste Recycling Centres.
- **5: Additional Waste Treatment Facility –** We will seek to maximise the amount of material that is recycled, composted or recovered from the residual waste stream.
- **6: Towards Zero Waste to Landfill –** We will strive to minimise the amount of waste that is disposed of in line with our principal of working towards zero waste to landfill.
- 7: **Monitoring and Review –** We will regularly monitor and review this Strategy in consultation with stakeholders and the public to ensure that it links with other plans and strategies.
