PARLIAMENTARY CONSTITUENCIES REVIEW

1. Summary

This is a further update for Members regarding the Parliamentary Constituencies review being undertaken by the four UK Boundary Commissions in their respective parts of the UK.

2. Recommendations

1. That the report be considered.
2. The initial proposals produced by the Boundary Commission for England be presented to a Members Seminar for discussion, and that
3. A further report regarding the proposals be submitted to Cabinet at its next meeting.

3. Reasons for the Recommendations

To ensure that Members are kept up to date with the proposed review of Parliamentary Constituency boundaries.

4. Members Interests

Members (including co-opted Members with voting rights) should consider whether they have a personal interest in the item as defined in the Council's code of conduct (**paragraph 8**) and, if so, declare the existence and nature of that interest in accordance with paragraph 9 of the code.

Where a Member regards him/herself as having a personal interest in the item, he/she must then consider whether that interest is one which a member of the public, with knowledge of the relevant facts, would reasonably regard as so significant that it is likely to prejudice the Member's judgement of the public interest (**paragraphs 10 and 11 of the code of conduct**).

A Member with a prejudicial interest in any matter must withdraw from the room where the meeting considering the business is being held -

- in a case where the Member is attending a meeting (including a meeting of a select committee) but only for the purpose of making representations, answering questions or giving evidence, provided the public are also allowed to attend the meeting for the same purpose whether under statutory right or otherwise, immediately after making representations, answering questions or giving evidence as the case may be;
- in any other case, whenever it becomes apparent that the business is being considered at the meeting;
- and must not exercise executive functions in relation to the matter and not seek improperly to influence the decision about the matter (**paragraph 12 of the Code**).

Further to the above, it should be noted that any Member attending a meeting of Cabinet, Select Committee etc; whether or not they are a Member of the Cabinet or Select Committee concerned, must declare any personal interest which they have in the business being considered at the meeting (unless the interest arises solely from the Member's membership of, or position of control or management on any other body to which the Member was appointed or nominated by the Council, or on any other body exercising functions of a public nature, when the interest only needs to be declared if and when the Member speaks on the matter), and if their interest is prejudicial, they must also leave the meeting room, subject to and in accordance with the provisions referred to above.

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SUMMARY

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RECOMMENDATION

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3. A further report regarding the proposals be submitted to Cabinet at its next meeting.

DETAIL

Background

1. An initial report was submitted to Cabinet on 14 July 2011. The report explained that the Parliamentary Voting System and Constituencies Act 2011 (“the Act”) required the four Boundary Commissions to conduct a review of the parliamentary constituencies in their part of the UK and to submit final reports to Government before 1 October, 2013.
2. The Act requires there to be a fixed number of 600 constituencies for the whole of the UK (as opposed to the current 650). The number of constituencies allocated to England is 502 (including the two reserved for the Isle of Wight).
3. The Boundary Commission for England (“BCE”) has subdivided the 500 England constituencies between the regions used for European Parliament elections.
4. The North East has been allocated 26 constituencies (currently it has 29). The BCE’s initial proposals will ensure that each of these constituencies are wholly contained in the North East region.
5. The BCE is also required by the Act to ensure that each constituency has an electorate that is no less than 95% and no more than 105% of the UK electoral quota.

This quota has been calculated at 76,641. Accordingly, each constituency must have an electorate that is no smaller than 72,810 and no larger than 80,473.

Initial Proposals

6. Taking these requirements into account, the BCE published its initial proposals for England, including the North East on 13 September, 2011.
7. Details of the North East proposals (a report booklet and maps 1A0 size and an A3 size book) have been received and are available for inspection at the Municipal Buildings as well at other locations in the Borough (a full list is attached at Appendix 1)
8. The BCE has also produced a summary of its initial proposals, a copy of extracts relevant to the Stockton-on-Tees Borough area is attached at Appendix 2.

The North East Proposals

10. The current North East constituencies (29) are listed at Appendix 3. The BCE's initial proposals for the North East comprise 26 constituencies. These are detailed at Appendix 4.

The Proposals for the Stockton-on-Tees Borough area.

11. Both of the existing constituencies have been changed significantly. The Stockton-on-Tees Borough area has been split into four constituencies, with the Borough retaining one.
12. The Billingham North Ward has been included in the Hartlepool Borough constituency. Billingham is not referred to in the name of that Constituency. The other four Billingham wards are retained in a new Stockton and Billingham Constituency, even though Billingham North is not a part of it and there are other wards within the Constituency.
13. The three Thornaby wards are included in a new Middlesborough Borough Constituency. There is no reference to Thornaby in the Constituency name.
14. The wards of Eaglescliffe, Ingleby Barwick East and Ingleby Barwick West, Parkfield and Oxbridge, Western Parishes and Yarm are included in a new Sedgefield and Yarm County (Durham) Constituency. Yarm is included in the Constituency title, even though there are other wards, one of which has a larger electorate (Eaglescliffe). More than half of the Constituency electorate are Stockton Borough electors.
15. Copies of the maps for the proposals affecting the Stockton Borough area are at Appendix 5.

Initial Consultation Period

16. A 12 week period of consultation by the BCE on its initial proposals began on the 13 September. This consultation will end on Monday 5 December 2011.

17. Written representations about the BCE's proposals can be submitted by visiting the website at www.consultation.boundarycommissionforengland.independent.gov.uk ; or by writing to Boundary Commission for England, 35 Great Smith Street, London, SW1P 3BQ; or by email to northeast@bcommengland.x.gsi.gov.uk
18. The BCE will also be taking oral representations at public hearings within each region of the UK. There are two proposed hearings in the North East, as follows:-
 - Monday 14 to Tuesday 15 November in Newcastle at the Civic Centre, Barras Bridge, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, NE1 8QH.
 - Thursday 17 to Friday 18 November in Darlington at the St George Hotel, Darlington, Durham Tees Valley Airport, Darlington, County Durham, DL2 1RH.
19. The hearings are not inquiries, public meetings or debates, but are intended to provide an opportunity both for the BCE to explain its initial proposals and for people to give their views on these proposals.

Secondary Consultation Period

20. As soon as possible after the initial 12 week consultation period, the BCE will publish on its website all of the representations it has received for each region, including verbatim transcripts of each public hearing. Hard copies will also be deposited in at least one location in each proposed constituency.
21. Once the representations have been published in this way, there will be a further statutory four week period, during which people can submit to the BCE written comments on the published representations.

Revised Proposals

22. After the end of the secondary consultation period, all of the representations received from the outset of the initial consultation will be considered and reports will be prepared for the BCE for each region. The reports will summarise and consider each of the representations, and recommend whether and if so, how, the BCE's initial proposals should be revised in light of the representations.
23. The BCE will then consider each such report and decide whether and to what extent revisions should be made to its initial proposals.
24. Following this, the BCE will publish a notice in each region, stating whether or not revisions have been made to its initial proposals for that region. All of the written representations submitted during the 4 week secondary consultation period will be published at the same time as the notice.

Final Consultation Period

25. If the initial proposals are revised, there is then a further, final period of eight weeks for written representations to be made to the BCE on the revised proposals for that area.

Final Recommendations and Report

26. The BCE will consider any representations made during the final consultation period about the revised proposals and will make its final decisions about whether further revisions are needed in light of these representations.
27. Once the BCE has decided on its final recommendations for the whole of England, it will then draft and submit a formal report to Government. The report, which will be published, will contain a description of the review in each region, a textual description of all of the final recommendations, and a set of maps to illustrate the existing constituency boundaries and those proposed by the final recommendations.
28. The submission of the formal, final report will conclude the review process.

Next Steps

29. There is still an opportunity (until the 5 December 2011) for written representations to be submitted to the BCE on the initial proposals. There is also an opportunity to attend and make representations at the two public hearings to be held in the North East.
30. A further report will be brought back to Cabinet after the end of the initial consultation period, once all of the representations received by the BCE have been published.

FINANCIAL AND LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Financial

31. There are no financial or legal implications arising directly from this report.
