1) Name of policy / function	The Licensing Of Sex Establishments					
2) Is this new or existing?	New					
3) What is the overall aim(s) of the policy / function?	Section 27 of the Policing and Crime Act 2009 amended Schedule 3 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provision) Act 1982 to enable local authorities to choose whether to control sexual entertainment venues. This affects establishments that provide 'relevant entertainment' as defined in the 1982 Act – for example (but not exclusively) premises that provide lap dancing, pole dancing, table dancing, strip shows, peep shows and live sex shows. Following consultation Stockton Council decided to adopt the legislation. The Council also determined a new policy on the licensing of sex establishments, which sets out how the council intends to administer the licensing process. The adopted legislation took effect on 1 April 2011. There then follows a 12 month transitional period during which no new operators can begin to trade, but existing operators may continue. Anyone wishing to operate a sexual entertainment venue from 1 April 2012 may only do so if they already have a licence granted by the Council. The aim is to achieve a fair and transparent method of controlling sex establishments in accordance with the relevant legislation					

4) What are the objectives of the policy / function?	The policy on the licensing of sex establishments sets out how the council intends to administer the licensing process. Before local authorities were able to control sexual entertainment venues, relevant entertainment was unrestricted. Premises offering such entertainment may have required an authorisation under the Licensing Act 2003 relating to the sale or supply of alcohol, provision of music, dancing, film, etc., or the provision of late night refreshment. The amendment of the relevant legislation means that Stockton Council is now able to control not only the number of sexual entertainment venues within the Borough, but also how they are permitted to operate. The public may be affected both directly and indirectly, and this is why extensive consultation was undertaken to help the Council decide whether or not to adopt the legislation and, if so, what should be in the policy on licensing sex establishments.

Members of the Licensing Committee and officers of the Trading Standards & Licensing Service under delegated powers as outlined in the constitution. Decisions will be made having regard to the appropriate legislation, guidance and the Council's policy.
