ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC HEALTH 2018/19

SUMMARY

The Annual Report of the Director of Public Health outlines some of the key health and wellbeing challenges and opportunities in Stockton Borough, including data, local intelligence, evidence and examples of current work with recommendations for next steps. This 2018/19 report titled "Lonely? Get Connected" focuses specifically on the local public health issue of loneliness.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION(S)/DECISION(S)

Cabinet is asked to consider the Report, to support the dissemination and implementation of key messages to improve health and wellbeing and address loneliness in the Borough. Following consideration by Cabinet, the Report will be presented to Council.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Cabinet recommend to Council that the Annual Report of the Director of Public Health 2018/19 be endorsed.

DETAIL

- 1. The Director of Public Health has a statutory duty to write an Annual Public Health Report (APHR) and the Local Authority a statutory duty to publish this independent report on the health of the local community.
- 2. This 2018/19 report begins by providing an overview of the health and wellbeing of Stockton-on-Tees residents with a particular focus on health inequalities. The report then takes a specific look at the public health issue of loneliness in the Borough. It explores what we know about 'who' is lonely and the impact on their health and wellbeing, shares some examples of local current work being delivered which addresses loneliness and then explores a range of solutions and recommendations for consideration. The final chapter outlines progress on the recommendations of the previous APHR.

COMMUNITY IMPACT IMPLICATIONS

The Report supports the delivery of Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2019-23 and the Council Plan. It is informed by the local Joint Strategic Needs Assessment, published evidence as well as local information gathered from consultation and engagement activity. All of these focus on identifying the needs of specific communities and working with communities and partners to tailor programmes and services to better meet that need. As such, the impact on communities in terms of improving health and wellbeing, reducing inequalities and protecting health, are inherent to the work outlined in the Report.
