PLACE THEME REVIEW - SUMMARY

Stockton-on-Tees has a diverse supply of land for development

Stockton-on-Tees is well placed to attract investment and new businesses with land available across a range of plot sizes and locations all connected by a significant infrastructure network.



Fuel Poverty has fallen²

An estimated 11.3% of households were in fuel poverty in Stockton-on-Tees in 2017; down from 13.4% the previous year. Stockton-on-Tees has the lowest fuel poverty levels in the Tees Valley.

Superfast Broadband availability continues to grow⁵

96.4% of premises in Stockton-on-Tees can currently access superfast broadband speeds of 30 Mb/Second. This has increased from 91.9% from 5 years previously.

Only a fraction of waste collected by Stockton Borough Council goes to landfill⁷

2.9% of waste collected in 2017-2018 ended up in landfill. Less than a quarter of the average national rate of 12.5%. 49.4% of waste was converted to energy and 31.7% was recycled / composted.

Record numbers of journeys on Stockton-on-Tees roads¹

In 2018, a record 941 million vehicle miles were travelled on Stockton-on-Tees roads of which 80.2% were cars / taxis. There has been a 7.8% rise in vehicle miles in Stockton-on-Tees in the last 5 years.

Housing in Stockton-on-Tees is some of the most affordable in the country

The average house price in Stockton-on-Tees in June 2019 was £132,696 compared to £246,728 nationally³. In 2018, the house price to earnings ratio in Stockton-on-Tees was 5.4 compared to 8.0 in England.⁴

CO₂ emissions are reducing⁶

CO₂ emissions in Stockton-on-Tees in 2017 were 2255.7 ktCO₂. That is a decrease of 4.7% from the previous 5 years and 12.5% lower than 10 years ago. Domestic emissions in particular have seen significant falls with 2017 emissions reduced by 26.6% in 5 years.



Local Wildlife sites are improving⁸

DEFRA figures on the status of sites of nature conservation importance show 59% of sites in Stockton-on-Tees were in positive management in 2018. This has grown from 57% in 2016 and is much higher than the national average (43%).

Strategic Updates

• Exclusive talks to buy British Steel (Gazette)

In August the Official Receiver confirmed an agreement had been signed with Ataer Holding AS – A Turkish firm, which will now hold exclusive talks to buy the steel firm that went into compulsory liquidation in May 2019.

The TVCA Local Industrial Strategy (LIS) was approved by the TVCA Cabinet in July 2019.

TVCA are now in discussions with Government teams in readiness for a jointly published LIS in the autumn.


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
CASE STUDY – Low Carbon and Renewable Energy in Stockton-on-Tees

The UK low carbon and renewable energy (LCRE) economy in 2017 grew to £44.5 billion and employs 209,500 full time equivalent (FTEs).

Stockton-on-Tees has seen significant reductions in Boroughwide greenhouse gas emissions with a 31.5%, or 1,412 kt reduction since 2005. 79% of Borough emissions in 2017 were from industrial processes.

In 2017, renewable electricity generation in the Borough totalled 81,777 MWh 9 which was an increase of over 50% on the previous year and prevented 23,149 tonnes of CO $_2$ e from the atmosphere. Most of the renewable energy generation in the Borough comes from onshore wind installations but solar generation and waste gasification are also significant contributors. For example, the 8Mw Lambs Hill Wind Farm became operational during this period.





The number of solar photovoltaic installations in Stockton-on-Tees has grown year-on-year with both domestic solar installations and large scale "solar farms" contributing to renewable electricity generation in the Borough.

The Borough is also a producer of hydro-power. In 2013 four Archimedes screws, weighing 30 tonnes apiece, were installed at Tees Barrage. The screws are used to pump water around the course but the flow of water also powers a generator providing renewable electricity generation. Since their installation the screws have generated 1,053,969 kWh, which is the equivalent of the annual domestic consumption of 340 houses and reducing emissions by 298 tonnes of CO₂e.

The LCRE economy in Stockton-on-Tees is not limited to renewable electricity generation. Many businesses in the borough are investing in technology to reduce their own emissions. Businesses involved in energy from waste, biofuel production, decommissioning of oil rigs and the manufacture of low carbon technologies all contribute to sustainable economic growth in the local area.

Examples in Stockton-on-Tees include 'Greenergy', Europe's largest manufacturer of biodiesel from waste vegetable oils and tallow, with a plant located at Seal Sands, capable of producing 250,000 tonnes of biodiesel (the UK's largest). The Borough is also home to parts of the supply chain for the wider North East electric vehicle market, including Mitsubishi Chemical Corporation's electrolyte plant and Johnson Matthey's growing research and development capability; both of whom are located in Billingham.
