Report on the Statistically Significant Differences between Residents aged 50+ and 16 – 49 Years, and Residents aged 65+ and 16 – 64 Years

INTRODUCTION

The Stockton on Tees Residents Survey 2008 was undertaken on behalf of Stockton on Tees Borough Council by Ipsos MORI and completed between 18th June and 27th August 2008. This report identifies the statistically significant differences in responses to that Survey from residents aged:

- (a) 16 49 and 50 +
- (b) 16 64 and 65 + 1

An 'Independent Samples T-Test' was run on the Survey data to test for statistically significant differences between responses from (a) and (b). A confidence level of 0.05 was used. This means that the test identified where it is 95% probable that the differences between responses for (a) and (b) are statically significant. The term 'statistically significant' does not confer any particular significance (i.e. power or importance) upon a finding. It simply means that it is unlikely to have occurred by chance.

The report has been produced with regard to the 19 different themes in the Survey to help identify with the number and type of differences of opinion across sets (a) and (b).

Appendix 1 contains paragraphs and charts that identify with the actual responses provided for sets (a) and (b) which have been considered to produce this report. Please use these to aid your interpretation and use of the data.

FINDINGS

STATISTICALLY SIGNIFICANT DIFFERENCES BETWEEN RESIDENTS AGED 16 – 49 AND RESIDENTS AGED 50+

Length of Time Resident in the Borough

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 – 49 have lived in the Stockton on Tees Borough Council area for over 30 years.

Satisfaction with the Local Area as a Place to Live

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16-49 are very satisfied with the area as a place to live.

Satisfaction with how the Council runs the Borough

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16-49 are satisfied with how the Council runs the Borough for the following reasons:

- Clean / tidy / street cleanliness

- Good refuse collection
- Good recycling facilities
- Good parks and open spaces
- The Council responds well / quickly to enquiries

Fewer residents aged 50+ than those aged 16-49 are satisfied with how the Council runs the Borough for the following reasons:

- Good leisure centre facilities
- Good community centres / good facilities in the local community
- The location / access to school places
- Good school results / good teachers

Fewer residents aged 50+ than those aged 16-49 do not know why they are satisfied with how the Council runs the Borough.

Dissatisfaction with how the Council runs the Borough

Improving quality of life in the Borough

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16-49 consider the following issues to be central to improving their quality of life:

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 - 49 have both seen a copy of "Stockton News" before <u>and</u> found it very useful.

Fewer residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 – 49 had accessed the Council website in the six months prior to the Survey.

Community Safety / Crime / Anti-Social Behaviour

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 - 49 feel both less safe when walking alone outside in their local area after dark <u>and</u> never go out after dark.

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16-49 are of the opinion that the following 'situations' are not a problem at all in their local area:

- Noisy neighbours or loud parties
- Teenagers hanging around the streets
- Vandalism, graffiti and other deliberate damage to property or vehicles
- People using or dealing drugs
- People being drunk or rowdy in public places
- Abandoned or burnt out cars

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 - 49 have been unaffected by crime in the last 12 months and, more specifically, fewer residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 - 49 have, in the last 12 months:

- Had their bicycle stolen

- Vandalism to their home because they had not got around to it / had left it too late.
- Being insulted or pestered whilst in a public place for reasons other than those offered in the Survey

Fewer residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 – 49 did not report any crime they were affected by to the police specifically because they were worried they would not be taken seriously.

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 - 49 did not report any crime they were affected by to the police specifically either because they did not get around to it / left it too late, or for reasons other than those offered in the Survey.

More residents aged 50+ than those aged 16 – 49 are fairly dissatisfied with:

- The levels of police patrol by marked vehicles in their local area in the last 12 months

Finally in this respect, most residents aged 50+ (but fewer than those aged 16-49) last saw a police officer on patrol in their local area, either on foot, cycle of in a police car within the last week.

Fewer residents aged 65+ than those aged 16 – 64 did not report being threatened with violence because they felt the crime was not serious enough to report

Fewer residents aged 65+ than those aged 16 – 64 reported being insulted or pestered whilst in a public place to a Police Community Support Officer.

More residents aged 65+ than those aged 16 – 64 are fairly dissatisfied with:

- The level of visible police patrols in their local areas in the last 12 months
- The level of visible police patrol in their nearest town centre in the last 12 months
- The levels of police patrol by marked vehicles in their local area in the last 12 months



Length of Time Resident in the Borough


There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who have lived in the Borough for over 30 years.

Satisfaction with the Local Area as a Place to Live

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are very satisfied with the area as a place to live.



Satsifaction with the Stockton on Tees Borough Council Area as a Place to Live

Satisfaction with the way that the Council is running the Borough

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of good leisure centre facilities. 4.7% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 2.4% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of good community centres / good facilities in the local community. 2.7% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 1.0% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because clean / tidy / street cleanliness. 17.2% of

residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 22.6% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of good refuse / rubbish collection. 18.1% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 24.6% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of good recycling facilities. 6.9% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 13.9% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of good parks and open spaces. 5.4% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 9.1% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of location / access to school places. 2.4% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 0.2% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of good school results / good teachers. 3.2% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 1.0% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are satisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because the Council responds well / quickly to enquiries. 1.7% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 3.8% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who don't know why they are satisfied

with the way the Council runs the Borough. 2.9% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 1.0% of residents aged 50+.

Dissatisfaction with the way that the Council is running the Borough

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are dissatisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of vandalism. 11.3% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 3.8% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are dissatisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of too much crime. 14.5% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 3.2% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are dissatisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because of dirty / untidy / poor street cleaning. 4.0% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 10.8% of residents aged 50+.

Council runs the Borough because of poor facilities for children / teenagers. 12.6% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 5.1% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who are dissatisfied with the way the Council runs the Borough because Thornaby town centre is dirty / run down / has lost its character. 2.6% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 11.5% of residents aged 50+.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference in results is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 49 and residents aged 50+ who feel that improved maintenance of footpaths would improve their quality of life. 3.3% of residents aged 16 - 49 are of this opinion compared with 5.3% of residents aged 50+.








Satisfaction with Council Tax Administration




Satisfaction with Traffic Flows (Anti-Congestion Measures)




Satisfaction with Support Services for Elderly people


Satisfaction with Parks and Open Spaces


Satisfaction with Town Centre Markets


Satisfaction with Road Maintenance and Repairs


Satisfaction with Pavement Maintenance








Satisfaction with Local NHS Hospitals






When you last Contacted the Council, how did you find the Staff


The Quality of the Council's Services are Good Overall






How Useful do you find 'Stockton News'



Satisfaction with the Way that Stockton on Tees Borough Council Provides its Services




How Safe do you Feel Walking Alone Outside in your Local Area After Dark




To what extent are Noisy Neighbours / Loud Parties a Problem in your Local Area




To what extent is Vandalism, Graffiti and other Deliberate Damage to Property or Vehicles a Problem in your Local Area








How Satisfied are you with the Level of Visible Police Patrols in your Local Area in the Last 12 Months


How Satisfied are you with the Level of Visible Police Patrol in your Nearest Town Centre in the Last 12 Months




When did you last see a Police Officer on Patrol, either on Foot, Cycle or in a Police Car in your Local Area



There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who said they are satisfied with the way the Council is running the Borough because of location / access to school places. 1.9% of residents aged 16 - 64 and 0.0% of residents aged 65+ are of this opinion.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who said they are satisfied with the way the Council is running the Borough because it has friendly / helpful staff. 1.5% of residents aged 16 - 64 and 4.4% of residents aged 65+ are of this opinion.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who said they are satisfied with the way the Council is running the Borough because the Council responds well / quickly to enquiries. 1.6% of residents aged 16-64 and 6.0% of residents aged 65+ are of this opinion.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who said they are satisfied with the way the Council is running the Borough because of good adult education classes. running the Borough because of too much crime. 10.8% of residents aged 16 – 64 and 2.6% of residents aged 65+ are of this opinion.










Satisfaction with Council Tax Administration


Satisfaction with Primary Schools


Satisfaction with Children's Centres


Satisfaction with Traffic Flows (Anti-Congestion Measures)


Satisfaction with Parks and Open Spaces


Satisfaction with Museum and Art Gallery


Satisfaction with Town Centre Markets


Satisfaction with Road Maintenance and Repairs


Satisfaction with Pavement Maintenance


Satisfaction with Refuse Collection


Satisfaction with Street Cleaning


Satisfaction with Street Lighting








Satisfaction with Local NHS Hospitals








When you contacted the Council last, how did you find the Staff


The Council is in Touch with People in the ...


The Quality of Council Services is Good Overall


The Council is too Remote and Impersonal




Previous Sight of a copy of 'Stockton News'

How Useful do you find Stockton News



Have you Accessed the Stockton on Tees Borough Council Web Site in the Last 12 Months




How Safe do you Feel Walking alone outside in your Local Area after Dark


To what Extent are Noisy Neighbours or Loud Parties a Problem in your Local Area


To what Extent are Teenagers Hanging around the Streets a Problem in your Local Area


How much of a Problem is Vandalism, Grafitti and other Deliberate Damage to Property or Vehicles in your Local Area





There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who had been insulted or pestered whilst in a public place and who reported it to a Police Community Support Officer. 16.2% of residents aged 16 - 64 and 0.0% of residents aged 65+ said this.


There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who had been threatened with violence in the last 12 months and did not report it to anyone because they felt the crime was not serious enough to report. 26.1% of residents aged 16 – 64 and 0.0% of residents aged 65+ said this.

There is a statistically significant difference (i.e. the difference is unlikely to have occurred by chance) between the proportion of residents aged 16 - 64 and residents aged 65+ who are satisfied with the levels of visible police patrol in the last 12 months.




How Satisfied are you with the Levels of Visible Police Patrol in the Last 12 months


How Satsified are you with Levels of Visible Police Patrol in your Nearest Town Centre in the Last 12 Months
