


Managing our risk - Prevention

- We use an integrated and targeted approach to focus on vulnerability, with services delivered to reduce risk and change peoples behaviours



Life Risk – Accidental fires within peoples home


Accidental dwelling fires <u>increased</u> by 29% (34 to 44)


Economic Risk – Arson and its consequential impact

- Calculable costs from arson have <u>increased</u> by 32% (£3.4m to £4.5m)
- Potential consequential costs = est £17.2m £34.4m

Crime related incidents;

- Arson has <u>increased</u> by 46% (548 to 801)
- Violence to our staff has increased by 55% (9 to 14)






Effects of crime on CFB; Stockton




ARSON (Criminal Damage Act 1971)


- Arson accounted for 84.9% (3656) of the total fires (4302) that CFB attended in 18-19
- Stockton = 801; 22% CFB's total deliberate fires.
- The direct economic cost to Stockton from arson is £4.5m
 In reality the real cost is between £17.2 £34.4m
- 3 main arson issues affect Stockton;
 - Refuse
 - Grassland
 - Vehicles
- Hotspot areas are;
 - Newtown
 - Stockton Town Centre




Local Arson Profile










What are we doing.....

.....to reduce accidental fires in the HOME; 'Safer Homes'

- Continually refining our proven risk assessment, contributing to specific JSNA process (more recently Alcohol & Substance misuse in Stockton) to identify those most at risk
- Targeting vulnerabilities, partners & organisations for Vulnerable Person Referrals
- Working with Safer Partnerships & local partners to resolve Safeguarding and complex needs when identified; Self Neglect, Fuel Poverty, Hoarding



- Consistently delivering 18 19,000 Safer Home Visits across Cleveland; 6,826 were delivered in Stockton during the last financial year 2018/19
- Working with partners to develop a multi-agency online tool for self assessment
- Piloting a 'Befriending service' in Hartlepool; to identify, develop & socially mobilise and empower lonely or isolated people. Looking to secure funding to expand this into Stockton
- 200 fires in the Home = £8m

Project Vision

- Creating the group(s); Staff identify people who are lonely or isolated and refer them into
 the initiative. Partners and local agencies also refer people into the initiative
- 'Safe Place as a Base'; Hartlepool and Headland Fire Stations will be used to regularly bring
 people together to form a group, advertising the 'Safe Place' building for wider communication
 by group members
- . Social mobilisation; Activities are provided to develop social skills and social mobility
- Upskilling; Group members are provided with personal development in the arena of Safer Homes, particularly in the area of Fuel Poverty, Winter Warmth, Dementia and Slips Trips & Falls – all linked with isolation.
- Self-Actualisation; Group members are offered the opportunity of becoming a 'specialist volunteer' to deliver Safer Homes Visits within Hartlepool District.
- Expansion; Showcase achievements and advertise the service to Stockton, Middlesbrough and R&C Local Authorities.
- Expanding use of ECINS; vulnerable person, risk premises (void/derelict), arson hotspots



- New Arson Reduction Strategy 2019-2022 involving partners and our communities
- Introducing domestic arson advice into our new Safer Homes Visits
- Introducing arson advice for local businesses and building owners
- Introducing new initiatives to **enable and empower local people**; <u>Fix-My-Street</u>
- Will be engaging with key stakeholders including;
 - Local Communities
 - Local Councillors
 - Partners
 - Safer Partnerships
- Arson conference to bring key stakeholders together
- Encouraging greater use of Powers under the Anti Social Behaviour Crime & Policing Act
- Encouraging the collaborative development of a Void / Derelict Property Risk register
- Developing Partnership Seasonal Campaigns aimed at reducing arson demand increases during school holidays
- Looking into the use of drones as a deterrent and a means to support prosecution
