Environmental Health like all departments have been heavily involved in this work which aims to create a Council website which is user friendly, allows for inclusion and easy access to services. The Animal Health webpages and forms are currently being finalised and subject to approval in March by the Head of Environmental Health and Animal Health/Welfare Manager will go live alongside all other services.
