Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy (JHWS) / Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) – Role of the Partnership

- 1. The Board will recall that it has previously tasked both Partnerships with work associated with the development of the JHWS and JSNA.
- 2. The Partnership would be working through some JSNA topics, at its next meeting.

Autism Self-Assessment Framework and Joint Health and Social Care Self-Assessment

- 3. Discussion centred on the Autism SAF and it was noted that findings coming from this were already being addressed by officers.
- 4. The Partnership will be considering the Autism Action Plan, at its meeting in June.

Commissioning Plan

5. The Commissioning Group continues to develop a table of potential joint commissioning topics, which is driving the forward plan and helping to focus discussion where it was needed, in a timely manner. A similar approach is also being adopted in the Children and Young People's Commissioning Group.

Home Improvement Agency

6. The Group received a report on the Handyman service and agreed it was highly valued by the community.

7. A tender exercise has recently been undertaken and a new provider was now in place.

Carer Service Update

- 8. The Group received a further update on the Carers' Service and a presentation on the features of an on line Carers' Hub that had been developed.
- 9. Members agreed that the Hub should have a soft launch and this was planned for June.
- 10. The Group was particularly keen to ensure that effective arrangement were put in place for those members of the community who did not have access to the internet.
