REPORT OF DOMESTIC ABUSE CO-ORINATOR

### 1. DOMESTIC ABUSE STRATEGY REVIEW

- 1.1 The work towards the five year Domestic Abuse strategy is currently at the half way point. Given this, it would be useful for members to have a full review as to the progress towards each of the 38 commitments set out in the strategy. Appendix 1 sets out each of the commitments, with an amalgamation of all the work delivered so far from the past three years' worth of action plans (each of which have been RAG rated).
- 1.2 The work towards the strategy is going well overall. Some of the commitments are rated as green however, work may continue on these as we progress over the forth coming years such as training. This is because some of the areas need continuous work and development. Also, some commitments have not yet been worked on (those RAG rated as grey) and these will remain the focus for the remaining two years of the strategy.

#### 2. KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- 2.1 Through the life of the strategy, there have been some positive achievements and progress made in relation to Domestic Abuse both nationally and locally- in particular:
  - Introduction of MATAC (Multi-Agency Task and Coordination group) in 2018 within Cleveland with a focus on serial perpetrators of Domestic Abuse. This is already noticing a positive impact with an average of 13% reduction of domestic abuse incidents from those perpetrators subject to MATAC.
  - Stockton becoming successful as one of three pilot sites for the Whole Housing and Domestic Abuse Pilot- with Stockton Borough Council leading the way locally in creating a model response to a diverse range of DA survivors in all types of housing tenures and settings. This has also allowed the review and development of the 'Safe at Home' scheme on offer within Stockton.
  - Department for Education- Introduction of compulsory relationships education and Relationship & Sex Education from September 2020 which will include training for teachers locally and resources around domestic abuse (age appropriate)
  - A push within Stockton on Tees in terms of awareness and extensive support for employers in recognising the impact of domestic abuse within the workplace and how best to support employees. The Domestic Abuse

Champions network within Stockton is continuing to expand and upskilling champions to raise awareness within their own organisations and provide them with the ability to signpost colleagues for support if they experience domestic abuse

- Harbour, the commissioned Domestic Abuse specialists for Stockton, now offering a wide range of support packages including a wide range of support for perpetrators via their Domestic Abuse Preventions Programmes. Harbour are also delivering a pilot in Stockton of the NSPCC's DART (Domestic Abuse Recovering Together) programme for victim mothers and children to support recovery.
- Review of the Domestic Abuse Operational Group means areas that are of concern (such as the high repeat figure within Stockton compared to the national average) as well as areas that we need to learn more about (such as Stalking and Child to parent abuse) will now have time dedicated to each subject in more detail via specific task and finish groups.

# 3. KEY PRIORITIES

- 3.1 The development of the yearly action plans depend on a multi-agency approach from the development of the particular action and milestones to the updating on delivery and performance. At times, engagement with some organisations has proved difficult in terms of commitment to the actions as well as updating on progress. However, the Domestic Abuse Steering Group have been informed when this is occurring and have supported in providing a resolution to this.
- 3.2 The Domestic Abuse Operational group will now be focusing on priority areas that will feed into the Domestic Abuse Steering Group. These include a focused group doing a deep dive exercise with the top 10 repeat victims due to the high repeat rate within Stockton on Tees. This has been on hold due to GDPR issues from Cleveland Police however, this has now been resolved and Cleveland Police have identified the top 10 repeat cases for Stockton so this work can now take place.
- 3.3 As well as repeats, the Domestic Abuse Operational group will also be focusing on Operation Encompass, Child to parent abuse and a focus on preventative interventions.

## 4. KEY STATISTICS

- 4.1 Between March 2017 and March 2018 both incidents and crimes related to domestic abuse have risen across all areas. Nationally incidents and crimes have risen by 12% in one year, 14% in the North East and only 5% in the Cleveland area (Year end 2017: 15, 535 incidents and crimes compared to Year end 2018: 16, 329).
- 4.2 The Repeat victim rate between April 2018 and March 2019 was at 46.9%. The Domestic Abuse Operational Group are due to do a deep dive into the top ten domestic abuse repeat cases (as identified by Cleveland Police) to understand this figure in more detail.
- 4.3 In terms of referrals into Children's services, one in ten were domestic abuse related. In relation to Adult Safeguarding, 17% were domestic abuse related at the referral point (most of which were financial abuse).

# 5. DOMESTIC ABUSE BILL 2019 UPDATE

- 5.1 MP's debated the second reading of the Domestic Abuse Bill in the House of Commons on the 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2019.
- 5.2 The Bill passed second reading without a division and now progresses to Committee stage. A carry over motion was also passed meaning that, if necessary, the Bill can continue its passage through Parliament in the next Parliamentary session.

# 3. CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S DOMESTIC ABUSE SCRUTINY REVIEW

- 3.1 The Children and Young People's select committee are currently reviewing Domestic Abuse. The overall aim of the review is to better understand the impact of domestic abuse on children and the effectiveness of interventions to inform the Domestic Abuse Strategy and future commissioning decisions.
- 3.2 The review involves input from SBC Children's Services, SBC Public Health, SBC DA Coordinator, Harbour Domestic Abuse services, Cleveland Police and the Office of Police and Crime Commissioner. The review will take approximately 5 months to complete with a report to Cabinet in January 2020.
