HWB Chair Update

1. The Chair of the Board provided an update on the work and plans of the Board, including the development of its reset Action Plan. He also thanked partner organisations for the work they had undertaken during the pandemic.

Covid 19 – Reflection for CYPP

- 2. The Partnership had considered a presentation that reflected on the impact of Covid 19, on Children's Services, with a view to the Partnership undertaking a broad discussion on members' experiences during the pandemic and to look at what had arisen and what were the issues the Partnership wanted to respond to.
- 3. The Partnership considered the vulnerable children's data base which had been developed, as a response to Covid, in order to monitor the vulnerable children in the Borough. The data base had only been possible through the sharing of information, across partners, and had created important strategic opportunities.
