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Stockton Health Centre Development Proposal

Consultation document

This document has been produced as part of the consultation process to improve access to and choice of primary care services through the establishment of a health centre in the North Tees Primary Care Trust (PCT) area. The information provided in this document explains the background to this proposal and outlines the need for this development. Your views on the health services planned for this development are very important.

As an NHS organisation we must involve and consult everyone who may use these services, and give them an opportunity to influence these decisions. This is a legal duty under Section 242 of the NHS Act 2006.

We must involve people in:

- On-going planning of these services
- Developing proposals for how these services will be delivered
- Decisions that may affect the way these services will work

Executive Summary

Improving access to health care services, particularly in primary care, remains a key priority for the NHS. Following the report produced by Lord Darzi in October 2007 (NHS Next Stage Review), the Government has made a commitment to improve access to and the responsiveness of primary care services.

Primary care services are the first port of call for most people who develop health problems. Primary care is the name given to the sorts of everyday health services provided by GPs, health visitors, dentists, optometrists, pharmacists and a range of specialist therapists. It also includes those services offered by GPs practices and health centres as well as some community based services:

Primary Care Trusts (PCTs) are responsible for improving the health of the community and developing primary care services provided in GP surgeries and health centres and in people's homes by GPs, nurses and other health professionals. PCTs identify the health needs of local people and make sure the right secondary care services - such as those delivered from hospitals - are available. PCTs also work with other organisations to ensure that the prevention of ill health and health improvement are part of local plans.

North Tees Primary Care Trust (PCT) has been identified as being a PCT that would benefit from a significant increase in resources to improve the health of the population, and has been asked to establish a GP-led health centre.


This health centre will provide a range of services that can be accessed by anyone living in the Stockton area.

It is hoped that the new health centre development will not only improve access to primary care services but will also have a significant impact on the inequalities in health experienced by the local population. It is envisaged that the health centre will lead to improved health outcomes, improved patient experience and provide a centre for the delivery of more joined-up community based services.

This consultation document has been produced in order to seek views on this proposal, and explains the role of the PCT in ensuring that health services are provided which meet the needs of the people in Stockton.

Unfortunately people in Stockton experience more ill health and disability and higher death rates from diseases such as cancer, heart, circulatory and respiratory (chest) disease, than other areas of the country. There is shorter life expectancy for both men and women.

Whilst the PCT and our primary care providers (GPs, dentists, pharmacists, opticians) are delivering high quality health services, and have undoubtedly made many improvements over the last few years, there is an increasing need to change the way in which services are provided across the community - providing services that are fair, personalised, effective and safe.



We need to make changes because:

- There are still high levels of ill health in Stockton.
- People rightly expect to have more say in how and where we provide their services.
- We need to expand the capacity of primary care services to improve access to services.
- We need to provide services that meet the needs and aspirations of patients, carers and the public including extended opening hours.
- We need to provide patients with greater choice.

About the PCT

North Tees PCT is the organisation that ensures you are provided with the services you need, looking after the health of people living in Stockton.

Our main role is to improve health and make sure that when people are ill they have access to the best possible health care, whether that may be in hospital or from community facilities.

We plan and purchase primary care, community hospital and specialist community health care services for the people of Stockton. It is our job to ensure you have access to good quality health care services in your community.

Traditionally, we have done this by providing some of these services directly. Now, to promote choice and to help a wider range of services develop, our role is changing so that our main job is purchasing services and ensuring they meet your needs.

Our Vision

We are working to achieve three things:

- Everyone in Stockton will be healthier, with the biggest improvements for those in poorest health
- Everyone in Stockton will have opportunities to improve their health and well-being
- Everyone in Stockton who uses healthcare services will have a safe, positive experience, every time

North Tees PCT is committed to improving the healthcare provision to ensure a healthier life for its resident population.

The PCT also aims to make sure support and care are provided in a way which meets local needs by:

- Giving everyone an equal opportunity to get the support they need to stay healthy.
- Purchasing improved services to give better access, choice and value for money.
- Developing our people, expertise, buildings and 'state of the art' equipment.
- Managing our money carefully.
- Ensuring that the people who use our services and the people who provide them have confidence in the NHS.
- Giving people a meaningful say in how our services develop.

We ensure that care will be provided in convenient, accessible locations, often directly within community settings provided it is safe and effective to do so.



The Proposals

Why have a new GP-led Health Centre?

The new GP-led health centre will allow the residents of Stockton to access primary care services at a time which is more convenient to them. The new GP-led health centre will provide additional services for a population with significant health needs.

The GP-led health centre

Nationally it has been agreed that the new health centre must:

- Provide core GP services
- Open from 8am 8pm, 7 days a week
- Provide 'bookable' GP appointments and walk in services
- Provide services for patients who are not registered at the GP led health centre and in the longer term, also provide patients the opportunity to register with the health centre, providing services for both registered and non-registered patients.
- Be GP-led

This means that while the health centre will offer the usual GP services, anyone should be able to get a GP appointment or walk-in service regardless of whether they are registered with the doctors at the Practice. The health centre needs to be open from 8am to 8pm, every day of the week.

In addition to the above, it is proposed that the health centre will also accommodate a range of other services helping to ensure that the local population and those living in the Stockton area are able to access appropriate and convenient services.

The location of the new health centre

The chosen location for the new health centre is the Tithebarn House site within the Hardwick ward.

The identification of a preferred location for the Health Centre has considered a number of factors including:

- Links with other planned and future health developments
- Opportunities to link with and co-locate with other services
- Use of previous public feedback to inform proposals, including the outcome of access surveys
- Locations within areas of greatest health need
- Accessible
- Availability of appropriate buildings
- Access to other services such as community pharmacies


The health centre will offer a range of services throughout its opening hours (8am to 8pm, 7 days per week). In addition the Tithebarn House site is the location of an existing GP practice and it is proposed that the services provided by this GP practice would also become part of the services that will be delivered by the new health centre.

What services will the new health centre provide?

As well as the routine services provided by GPs additional services will be available at the health centre. These will include:

- Child health surveillance (care provided by professionals to prevent illness and promote good health e.g. ensuring that children receive the right immunisations).
- Minor surgery (conditions that can be treated quickly and easily under local anaesthetic)
- Maternity medical services
- Contraceptive services
- Childhood immunisations and preschool boosters e.g. MMR
- Vaccinations and immunisations
- Flu jabs
- Cardiovascular (blood and heart) disease screening
- Services to support people stop smoking
- Services to support people who misuse alcohol
- Anticoagulation monitoring (for people on drugs to prevent blood clotting)
- Fitting of contraceptive devices (e.g. the coil)

North Tees PCT will look to secure further clinical services in line with the needs and wishes of the local people.
