In addition to this, legislation should be extended to make the installation of carbon monoxide alarms in all forms of holiday home, including caravans, with gas and solid fuel burning appliances a legal requirement.

Evidence of Progress (March 2022):	Letters were sent and positive responses received from both local MPs.  Alex Cunningham MP gave a commitment to I will write to the government in support of the Select Committee recommendations.  Matthew Vickers MP also gave a commitment to discuss this report with colleagues in the Government and advised that following consultation on the Social Housing Green Paper, there are plans to extend legislation to properties owned by social landlords alongside a requirement for carbon monoxide alarms to be installed in rooms with fixed combustion appliances. The consultation receiving an overwhelming support for a renewed focus on tenant safety and parity between the social and private sector housing sectors. In addition, the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government were analysing responses to a consultation which sought views on extending the 2015 Regulations to require private and social landlords to install a carbon monoxide alarm in any room used as living accommodation where a fixed

	Lord Greenhalgh Minister of State for Building Safety and Fire also responded that the Government has consulted on proposals to extend building and housing regulations to require the provision of carbon monoxide alarms to oil and gas heating installations and to social housing. The Government response to this consultation and next steps to be announced in due course.
