ASB report

Figures reported are for the 12 month period 1st October 2009 to 30th September 2010. This is the same time period used for the forthcoming Partnership Strategic Assessment.

There were 16,822 total ASB incidents recorded by the Police during the reporting period; a 15.3% reduction on the same period last year. Of note there have been some changes within the different categories of ASB. This is mainly due to changes in working practices as of April 2010 to implement a more robust system where a member of police support staff now audits the categories to ensure incidents are recorded appropriately. As a result, AS11 rowdy or inconsiderate behaviour now accounts for 55% of all incidents, which is a reduction on the same period last year when this category accounted for 60% overall. AS15 vehicle nuisance was the next highest category of ASB accounting for 12% overall, followed by AS10 nuisance neighbours with 11%.



In total 40% of all police ASB incidents were youth related, although this figure relies upon the youth flag being applied correctly or keywords within the free text field so this figure could be higher. Youth related disorder peaked on Friday and Saturday evenings between 7pm – 9pm.


There were 965 incidents involving quad bikes / off road motorbikes which is 6% of all incidents, so this is still a problem albeit not to the levels of previous years. Quad bike incidents occurred on all days of the week and peaked in the afternoon to early evening between 3pm – 8pm (51%).

The peak times for AS11 rowdy or inconsiderate behaviour were Friday and Saturday evenings into the early hours, with the times 6pm – 10pm the busiest times each day of the week.

Incidents peaked in October, which has been a common trend over the last few years. April also saw a rise in incident levels, which was sustained throughout the summer months. Of note there were notably fewer incidents in February which has not occurred in previous years.




During the reporting period the ASB team has also seen a reduction in the number of incidents with total service requests falling by 675 (-27%) from 2,542 to 1,867. As a result there has also been a reduction in the number of actions carried out as shown below in the two pyramid diagrams.



In total 31% of ASB reported to the ASB team was alcohol related, but this only includes incidents where the alcohol misuse or drunkenness was the main category of ASB. This does not include incidents such as missile throwing or verbal abuse that could have been fuelled by the fact the perpetrator had been drinking alcohol.

70% of all service requests were generated from AS13s, alcohol confiscations or section 27s being issued. 12% were as a result of the 24/7 hotline, with a further 7% from calls directly to the ASB team. 7% resulted from diary sheets and only 2% via website reporting.

In terms of seasonality, October was the busiest month for AS13 forms. Interestingly there was also a peak in February which is the opposite of the Police recorded ASB. December was a particularly quiet month, which coincides with the heavy snow that month.



Friday evenings between 7pm – 9pm is the busiest time for AS13s to be issued (which is the same as police recorded youth ASB), and as would be expected the Friday and Saturday nights into the early hours of the next day are the busiest periods for section 27s.

In terms of location, the top five wards were fairly consistent when looking at the different data sources.

Anti social behaviour continues to be male dominated, and largely youth related as the table below demonstrates. In total 52% of those issued with an AS13 form were aged between 14 - 16 years.

Of note 27% of all people receiving either an AS13, section 27 or alcohol confiscation were known to be a THL tenant, as well as 42% of those who signed an ABC and one person granted an ABSO.
