Analysis of responses to the audit consultation 2010 – full results

- The attached report provides the full analysis of responses to our consultation. Members will recall a summary report was brought to our meeting of November 9th.
- 2. Of note in the full report:
 - a) Dwelling burglary was a key priority in four wards all of which have significant levels of affluence.
 - b) Diverting Young People from Offending was a key priority for seven wards and for the Billingham Area Partnership area.
 - c) Robbery was in the top six for five wards, the Western Area Partnership area and to those who do not live in the borough.
 - d) Prostitution was a priority for three wards, for those under 16 and
 - e) The priorities varied slightly for those who had read the magazine (33%) and those who had not(51%). The top five were the same as the overall priorities for those who had read the magazine but dwelling burglary was their sixth priority. The top four were the same for those who had not read the magazine but they ranked Domestic Violence as fifth and criminal damage as sixth. 33% did not answer this question.
 - f) For those who felt more safe (38%) after reading the magazine their top five priorities mirrored the overall pattern but they chose Diverting Young People as their sixth priority. For those feeling less safe (4%) after reading the magazine Drug related offending was their top priority, they did not choose criminal damage but did choose dwelling burglary as the sixth priority. Of note 55% felt no different after reading the magazine.
 - g) Some people took the time to comment and a number of their comments are shown below:

"I feel proud that you have come into school, it just shows that you care"

" Doing this will surely help and make our environment a safer and better place"

"I got the magazine at home and I liked it"
