This is linked to the increased proportion of drug trigger offences requiring a drug test in that period. In January the proportion of alcohol related arrests receiving an intervention increased considerably to 44%. Following a drop in mandatory drug testing demand. Due to decommissioning of the existing arrest referral contract the February and March data is not available.</p> <p>In addition to those arrested for alcohol fuelled domestic violence, a significant number (44 individuals in Q2 2013/14) of those receiving an alcohol intervention reveal a pattern of domestic violence. Often this is new intelligence and can be acted on before the victim makes any contact with the police. Q3 and Q4 data is not available following decommissioning of the existing arrest referral contract.</p>
