Re: Crime and Disorder Introduction

1 The attached report provides an overview on crime and anti-social behaviour levels in the borough of Stockton between April to September 2014.

Key findings

- **2** Between April 2014 and September 2014, both publicly reported (-12.1%) and total crime (-11%) have reduced in the borough of Stockton.
- 3 This equates to 647 fewer victims of crime.
- 4 Comparisons with neighbouring local authority areas also show that Stockton has seen the biggest reduction to date.
- 5 Stockton also remains the safest place to live in relation to rates per 1000 population for both crime and ASB.
- 6 Despite overall crime reducing, there still continues to be slight increases in offences of violence (52 offences/+5.8%), rape (10 offences/+23.08%) and other sexual offences (10 offences/+13.9%).
- 7 Domestic related violence however has reduced by 217 offences, a significant decrease of 53.2%.
- 8 There are no concerns with regards to knife, gun or serious violence in Stockton.
- 9 However there are excellent reductions in several key crime areas: Personal robbery (-16 crimes/-39%), Burglary non-domestic (-102 crimes/-24.5%). Vehicle crime (-120 crimes/-28.7%) and Shoplifting (-102 crimes/-12.6%).
- **10** Burglary dwelling has also reduced this month and is now showing a 3.1% decrease on last year. Burglary offences in September also reduced by nearly half with only 27 offences compared to 45 in September 2013.
- **11** The forecast for the end of financial year is also projecting a reduction of 6.1%, the biggest anticipated decrease in crime levels when compared to neighbouring local authorities.
- **12** ASB is also showing a positive picture this period and we are the only local authority area to see a reduction (-1.8%).
- 13 Despite the decrease in ASB, if levels continue at the current rate, then a 6.5% increase is anticipated however we would still have the lowest increase when compared to Hartlepool (13.7%), Middlesbrough (17.9%) and Redcar & Cleveland (17.4%).
- 14 There have been no significant changes to offending locations when compared to last year.
- 15 There are no new emerging issues in relation to crime and disorder in Stockton borough.

Crime categories showing increases	 Violence against the person (5.8%) Month on month increases in both with and without injury. With exception of April and August there has been an increase each month, in particular during May (up 22 offences) and recent month of September (up 21 offences). However there still does not appear to be any obvious areas to identify reasoning behind this. There are no concerns with regards to knife, gun or serious violence. Domestic related violence however is showing a reduction, from 408 to 191 crimes, a 53.2% reduction. Offences also accounted for only 20.2% of all violence, compared to 45.7% last year. There is nothing to indicate why offences are reducing so significantly and this is also the same for domestic related incidents (-579 incidents/-30.5%). This is also similar across the Cleveland Force area in comparison to increases in non-domestic related violence. Sexual offences (17.5%) As noted in previous report, increases are linked to rape offences which are mainly historical with offenders known to their victims. No present concerns with stranger rapes. During September there was also a reduction of three offences compared to September last year.

Forthcoming period	Currently projecting a reduction of 6.1% for end of Financial year. Reductions also seen in the most recent month (September) from 956 crimes to 772. That's 184 fewer victims of crime in one month. The current month of October and beginning of November often see increases in crime and ASB towards the end of the month due to Halloween and Bonfire night. Police and SBC ASB/Enforcement Teams have extra operational activity planned in order to cover this time period. Extra patrols and targeting of specific locations resulted in offences of criminal damage reducing in October and November 2013 when compared to 2012.
