The actions within this plan are supported by the Community Safety Plan, which includes performance measures regarding police data, measures of domestic abuse related police incidents involving perpetrators of domestic abuse engaged with interventions, the number of repeat victims in MARAC accessing domestic abuse support, reducing repeat victims of domestic abuse and maintaining the percentage of those referred to the Independent Domestic Violence Advocate (IDVA) service.

Domestic Abuse Strategy Action Plan 15/16 The Domestic Abuse Strategy identifies a need to focus on Awareness and Education, Early Intervention and Support and Protection. The following actions are all encompassed within these key themes.
