


Domestic Abuse Strategy Action Plan 16/17

- 1. To raise awareness and education of the health, psychological and social implications of domestic abuse.
- 2. To increase early interventions in domestic abuse cases
- 3. To ensure support and protection is available and effective

This action plan is supported by the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy, Community Safety Plan and Tees Sexual Violence Implementation Group Business plan. The actions within the plan are reported to The Domestic Abuse Steering Group, set up to ensure the strategic co-ordination of activities to prevent and respond to Domestic Abuse and support multi agency working (to be operational in 2016). The Domestic Abuse Steering Group will report to the Health and Wellbeing Board. The plan has contributions from the Local Executive Group for Safeguarding Adults (LEGSA) and the Local Safeguarding Children's Board (LSCB).

The action plan aims to link to priority objectives within the Joint Health and wellbeing strategy.

Policy objectives identified in strategy

1. Give every child the best start in life

Our Objectives:

Improve access to evidence based programmes to support healthy lifestyles with effective follow on support for those who need further support and treatment.

What we will do:

Offer increased support for families and target interventions for vulnerable families Reduce the damage from substance misuse (smoking, drugs and alcohol) and from domestic violence

2. Enable all children, young people and adults to maximise their capabilities and have control over their lives

Our Objectives:

Maximise choice and control across health and social care

What we will do:

Increase self-management and support

3. Create and develop healthy and sustainable places and communities

Our Objectives:

Have vibrant and cohesive communities.

What we will do:

Develop community engagement to champion health and wellbeing issues and reduce social isolation.

4. Strengthen the role and impact of ill-health prevention

Our Objectives:

Increase the number of people adopting healthy lifestyles including good mental health.

What we will do:

Improve how we signpost and support people to access services
Improve how we engage with those most at risk of poor health outcomes.

Target our programmes at those who need it most, in particular vulnerable groups such as carers or people with a Learning Disability

The actions within this plan are supported by the Community Safety Plan, which includes performance measures regarding police data, measures of domestic abuse related police incidents involving perpetrators of domestic abuse engaged with interventions, the number of repeat victims in MARAC accessing domestic abuse support, reducing repeat victims of domestic abuse and maintaining the percentage of those referred to the Independent Domestic Violence Advocate (IDVA) service.
