Safer Stockton Partnership Plan 2021

Consultation results summary

Introduction



On behalf of the Safer Stockton Partnership (SSP), a public consultation was undertaken to help inform and refresh the Community Safety Plan which sets out how agencies within the Partnership intend to achieve targets in crime reduction.

The feedback will inform what residents feel that the partnership should be focusing on during the next period. All responses to the survey were completely anonymous.

The consultation involved an on online questionnaire available between 1st February 30th April 2021 and activity resulted in a total sample size of **143 responses**.

Responses – profile

• Profiling data collected as part of the survey provides a breakdown of respondents' gender, age, ethnicity, disability status and postcode, summarised in this section of the report.

Gender

- The majority [57%] of the responses came from 'Female' residents whilst over a third [35%] were from 'Male' residents.

	During lockdown, more people have been out walking, but this has created more litter and dog fouling issues. We need to educate people not to litter in the first place and pick up the poop and put it in a bin, it is not a tree bauble! Start in schools, but tackle teenagers and young people and their perceptions of why it is not ok to drop litter etc. Get young offenders to help with community litter picks again, but explain the damage it causes - mice suffocating to death in plastic bottles, dogs standing on broken glass, animals ingesting damaging substances by eating plastics, wrappers etc. Not only is it unsightly, but it's dangerous, especially to wildlife. The same for littering and fly tipping, it needs more prosecutions for people to decide it's not worth the risk (if they don't care about anything but themselves). Taking rubbish to the tip, re-cycling and re-using, caring for and taking pride in where you live - these are the
98	things we need to instill. Speeding through and within our village of Stillington is terrible. We have absolutely no traffic calming measures within the village, especially outside of the school where traffic does not slow down and cars donâ€ [™] t stop for the crossing. Every school I travel past has traffic calming measures, so why doesnâ€ [™] t Stillington? When I have asked the council safety department the answer was that there have not been accidents so no need to take any measures. I see this as very short sited, why does there have to be an accident before something is done? Why canâ€ [™] t the council listen to people who also pay huge amounts of council tax only to be ignored when thereâ€ [™] s an issue that needs to be addressed.

1	The police have limited people on the streets as it is so that itself justifies a move to artificial intelligence such as CCTV. More should be invested in automation to free up the police time. Also idiots like my neighbours who call the police out regularly should be charged a fine if they call out more than twice a month for excessive use of the service! That would deter them wasting police time		
2	The drug issues need addressing and not by neighbourhood teams who ignore them .		
3	More police on the streets. patrolling. actually walking the streets like police used to do years ago		
4	I have lived in my house 25yrs,anti social behaviour has grown massively in the last few years,no visible patrols from police or community support		
5	There are a small number of families who are responsible for the majority of the problems, all of which are known to the authorities. If action was taken against them it would send a message to others particularly if they lost their home		
6	Feel like when it is reported action doesn't appear to be taken		
7	Speeding and drivers using mobile phones is a big issue in Ingleby Barwick. Blair Avenue has a Speed indicator sign near Snowden Grove. Regularly see cars doing over 40mph here! Near schools- very dangerous.		
8	Mindless vandalism. St Andrew's Church on Hardwick Estate has had nearly 20 windows broken during the last few months. The excess on the insurance claims is putting pressure on the finances and the Food Bank is in danger of having to close if this goes on. As soon as windows are protected they move onto others.		
9	Parents need to be made more accountable for their children's actions		
10	Need to provide more support to communities to stop speeding pandemic. People feel they can do as they like because there is not sufficient deterrents in place. Same for wildlife crime. Equally punishment needs to be firmer and consistent.		
11	There needs to be a multi agency approach to identify and take appropriate action against the small minority of people who are having a significant impact on the lives of decent hardworking law abiding people.		

12	A heavy hand needs to be used towards those who are repeat offenders. Clearly the softly, softly approach is not working.
13	Stockton town centre is intimidating, a greater police presence is needed to reassurance vulnerable people that it is safe to visit. An elderly man robbed at a cash point at 8.30 am makes for frightening reading. Cycling through Dovecot Street feels threatening. I've had beggars hassle me in the car park opposite the police station, it doesn't feel safe.
14	There is common belief that youngsters can buy drugs from the convenience store on Elm Tree Parade.
15	Its going on all over the place and nobody in authority does anything about it. Absolute waste of time reporting it
16	I live in Thornaby ~ a small town with a strong community. Unfortunately some minorities spoil some areas and these people MUST be dealt with. Some parts of the town are no-go areas with drug and anti-social behaviour problems - even with young children
17	There are no go areas in Stockton I wouldn't dream of walking down Yarm road for instance the town centre is full of groups of people who all seem to be high on drugs.
18	Too many steps put in place between crime and conviction. CPS don't treat crime serious enough or quick enough
19	The area of Hardwick and Roseworth seems to be run by either groups of youths or people dealing drugs.
20	Things are getting worse when ever something happens the police don't seem bothered and nor do anyone else
21	Unfortunately lots of people begging in Stockton Town centre making it feel uncomfortable to be in the town centre and shop alone
22	Please deal with car crime and dog theft
23	Police are way to lenient with trouble makers and instead of Enforcing and reiterating consequences wal past youth and other trouble makers doing the wrong thing making criminals believe that they can get away with whatever they want.
24	I am a big bloke, ex-boxer, but when the police refuse to deal with criminals and Thirteen Group support them over good people I begin to fear for our future. Gangs roam about unchecked. Police drive past gangs of kids despite COVID. I was told "You are on your own the police don't care and I will decide what to do to you when I want" by a local thug. I do not take the dog out after dark. It's a disgrace.
25	Anti-socisl behaviour may not he such an issue if kids had youth clubs etc to go but now they are all closed they have nothing to do
26	Dog theft is also massively on the increase and this also needs to carry harsher sentences as a deterrent. Dogs are a huge part of families and therapy dogs also play a very vital role in people's lives. This cruelty and the pain and hurt it causes to their owners needs to stop!
27	People riding on paths early morning on motorbikes
28	More visible policing.
29	In my eyes it is getting worse instead of better
30	Whilst in hospital last year I could'nt believe the amount of drug deals that went on outside the main entrance at North Tees, I actually think they send money over bank transfer, as they were checking phones before hand stuff over. Also the theft and staff abuse by Drug addicts in the hospital is unbelievable.
31	I live in a relatively safe area but work near the town centre where levels of addiction poverty and associated crime appear to be increasing to the point where businesses are affected staff feel unsafe etc. The dealing of drugs is blatant and goes on during the day along with prostitution and anti social behaviour. I've worked in this area for 14 years and it has gotten much much worse during that time. It seems as though very little is done to address this at either a local or national level.

32	My community appears to be fine but I feel uneasy going into the town centre. Some of the streets leading into the town centre feel intimidating to walk down.
33	Off road bikes in woods increasing. Crimes in Ingleby Barwick increasing

35	I now feel that our own homes are no longer a safe place. There are too many break ins even when people are at home. I have noted at least two private security companies offering their services which should not be needed.
36	Stockton on tees is infested with drugs, crime and antisocial behaviour. I don't feel safe walking about on my own.
37	Its getting worse and tougher punishment for repeat offenders is needed.
38	I believe the question is flawed - we have been in lock down for moths
39	As l'm sure you know all the problems on hardwick at the moment they need sorting
40	It's the kids who are getting younger and younger roaming the streets, damaging property and being anti social and rude
41	I don't think enough immediate support is available. There are often vehicles broken into round here but the police can take hours to come if they do at all
42	Organised crime groups in Hartburn nothing gets done
43	Anti Social behavior, late night parties lous music, unruly children offensive graffiti
44	The crime on the streets at night is greater now. Police only patrol Stockton during the day
45	Since lockdown have felt more unsafe than ever. Car crime twice and thefts of dogs / fear of this. Scared to walk my dog in parks etc which is crazy
46	I actually feel mainly safe where I live in ingleby Barwick. I donâ€ [™] t worry about burglary or personal attack for example. I do see an emergence in more anti social behaviour and a general disregard for neighbours through parking on pavements, littering, deliberately broken trees, youngsters hanging around Tesco, cars being raced. Nothing earth shattering in comparison I know, but could be tackled when you are working with the local schools.
47	Community centres for teenagers
48	It is getting out of control and needs addressing as a matter of urgency.
49	Drugs are so prevalent now and the associated crimes, that l'm just going to research living away from the area.
50	Young people swearing loudly in the streets needs to be curtailed.
51	We need more police
52	I personally think drugs and lack of real jobs is the issue - there needs to be competitive rates for businesses in the area to form jobs, otherwise stockton will continue to fall into it's negative feedback loop of no businesses, no good jobs, and producing more crime. All resources need to be on the streets, and running positive campaigns does nothing without cutting rates and creating a healthy environment for businesses in the highstreet.
53	The levels of crime are scandalous, frightening and you feel unsafe in your own neighbourhood. It's a horrible place to be bringing up children as it is definitely getting worse.
54	Teenagers vandalising peoples property this needs to stop!
55	The children are controlling the streets. Lack of police presence is not helping. The children need to be helped before they get to adults and start doing other more serious crimes
56	The police wonâ€ [™] t do anything we need something putting in place asap, drugs blatantly sold outside your home and teenagers destroying other peopleâ€ [™] s property, churches, cars, vanâ€ [™] s and abusing staff going to work in local shops (Hardwick shops) We need community officers and police in the area and CCTV asap.

57	Sort out Hardwick before it sorts it self out. Dog poo, litter, car crime and anti social behaviour. Residence feel Asif the police and council don't care.
58	Stockton-On-Tees is a large area. It needs to have a â€~presence' in every location. Somewhere people can go for advice before events become critical.
59	It's needs to reduce as people don't feel safe and the law and police need to be around to give harder punishment to people and then they would think before they did it and also dish out more community's service for them to clean up there own areas and so people can see they have done wrong
60	If we don't get on top of this next generation of criminals, who cause distress, all the good, community minded decent people will not want to live here and it will just get worse
61	I am really concerned about the amount of anti-social behaviour in town centre. People have been followed, threatened and intimidated by youths and even schoolchildren, roaming the high street after dusk. If you are waiting for a bus you are a target. Plenty of cases mentioned on Stockton on Tees Alert on Facebook. As nothing is done they become emboldened and feel they rule the high street. Appalling state of affairs.
62	The amount of racist comments coming from people that are clearly ignorant of everything including the nose on their face is abysmal in Stockton south! I think some sort of drive to stamp this out is desperately needed, I have even heard vile racist terms and ridiculous prejudiced views in the school playground with in ear shit of children and it is very concerning and frightening. The current climate helps nothing either - less money due to COVID, too much time on people's hands due to COVID and brexit has seemingly woken the closeted racists who now believe their views are very much the norm and acceptable.
63	Begging and "homelessness" is a real issue; beggars are often aggressive and persistent, this is very off- putting if you are out shopping. The public needs educating that just because someone is begging and saying they are homeless, it doesn't mean they are. Sadly, it's often quick money for a quick fix and why people continue to give money, free food etc, the incentive remains to continue the behaviour. I know there are services available to help addicts and those in temporary accommodation or no fixed abode, but more needs to be done to prevent individuals harassing the public and being a thorn in the side to local businesses. The same goes for shop lifting, I know so many shops that suffer day in and day out with this and despite CCTV footage etc nothing seems to happen to arrest the perpetrators or to prevent them from re-offending. I realise on the grand scale of crime, shop lifting is minor, but it isn't if your shop is constantly targeted and your staff are fearful. More police, more powers to arrest, more "bobbies on the beat" and a visual presence is the only thing that will work as a deterrent to stop criminal behaviour.
64	We have been abandoned by SBC, yet SBC were happy to start their businesses of shipping in out of area cared for children to their new business opened in the village of Stillington. We now have more vandalism and antisocial behaviour than ever and we see absolutely no police in the village at all. People feel unsafe in their own houses and whilst out and abut in the village.
