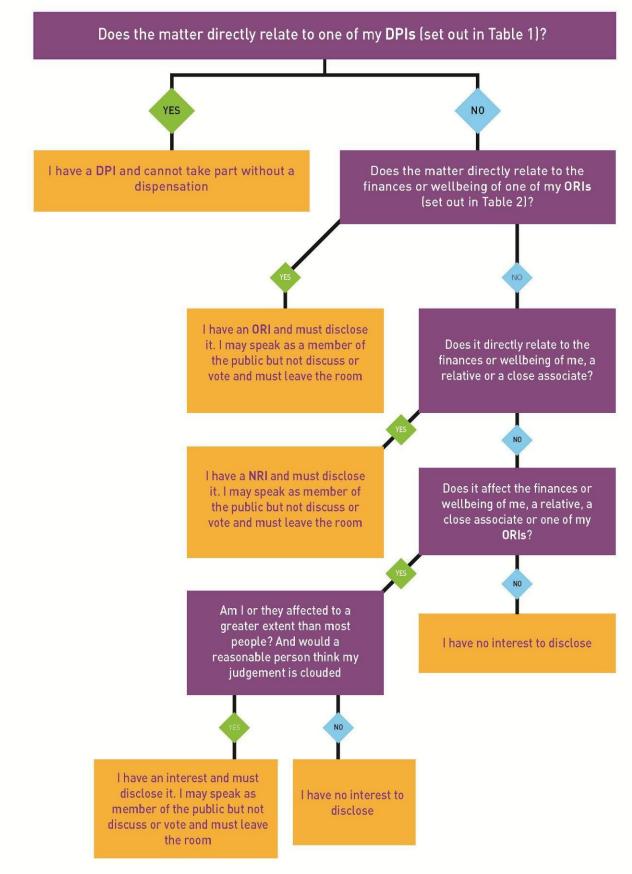




Table 1 - Disclosable Pecuniary Interests

Subject	Description
Employment, office, trade, profession or vocation	Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain
SponsorshipAny payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from the councillor during the previous 12-month period for expenses incurrent him/her in carrying out his/her duties as a councillor, or towards his/her election expenses. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the mean of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.	
Contracts	Any contract made between the councillor or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/civil partners (or a firm in which such person is a partner, or an incorporated body of which such person is a director* or a body that such person has a beneficial interest in the securities of*) and the council
	 (a) under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed; and (b) which has not been fully discharged.
Land and property	Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of the council. 'Land' excludes an easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not give the councillor or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/ civil partners (alone or jointly with another) a right to occupy or to receive income.
Licences	Any licence (alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of the council for a month or longer.
Corporate tenancies	Any tenancy where (to the councillor's knowledge)— (a) the landlord is the council; and (b) the tenant is a body that the councillor, or his/her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/ civil partners is a partner of or a director* of or has a beneficial interest in the securities* of.
Securities	Any beneficial interest in securities* of a body where— (a) that body (to the councillor's knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of the council; and (b) either— (i) the total nominal value of the securities* exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body; or (ii) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which the councillor, or his/ her spouse or civil partner or the person with whom the councillor is living as if they were spouses/civil partners have a beneficial interest exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

* 'director' includes a member of the committee of management of an industrial and provident society.

* 'securities' means shares, debentures, debenture stock, loan stock, bonds, units of a collective investment scheme within the meaning of the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000 and other securities of any description, other than money deposited with a building society.



Table 2 – Other Registerable Interest

You must register as an Other Registrable Interest:

a) any unpaid directorships

b) any body of which you are a member or are in a position of general control or management and to which you are nominated or appointed by your authority

- c) any body
- (i) exercising functions of a public nature
- (ii) directed to charitable purposes or

(iii) one of whose principal purposes includes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union) of which you are a member or in a position of general control or management

RECORDED CRIME & ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Introduction

- This report provides an overview on recorded crime, anti-social behaviour incidents and domestic abuse in the Borough of Stockton-on-Tees for the 12-month period of February 2023 – February 2024.
- 2. The bulk of the statistics utilised for this report have been obtained from Cleveland Police crime statistic databases, the figures are correct at the time of data extraction as provided by Cleveland Police on 19/03/2024. The data is extracted from 'live' systems and therefore remains the subject of on-going operational activity, audit, and scrutiny.
- 3. This report will not provide any detailed analysis unless there are any substantial changes to patterns or trends.
- 4. A comparison against other similar Community Safety Partnerships utilising iQuanta is noted within a separate report (This report is a RESTRICTED document due to the statistical information only made available as an intelligence tool until released by the Home Office).
- 5. Any references to rates per 1,000 population are based on the ONS UK Mid-year population estimates for 2021.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

<u>Crime</u>

The rate per 1,000 population (all ages)¹ for publicly reported crime in Stockton-on-Tees was 116.9 for February 2023 – February 2024.

Between February 2023 – February 2024, there were 19,407 publicly reported offences, which is a decrease of -691 crimes (or -3.4%) on the same period in the previous year. Police generated crime, which includes crimes such as drug offences, public disorder and possession of weapons has decreased by -540 crimes in comparison with the previous period, giving total police generated crime figure of 3628 offences, down -13.0% on the same period the previous year. Overall, there was a total of 23035 crimes, equal to 1231 (5.1%) less crimes compared with the same period last year.

Comparing the number of crimes recorded in the period February 2023 vs February 2024, there was an increase in the following crime types recorded in the Borough:

- Burglary Residential
- Death or injury due to driving
- Homicide
- Misc. crimes against society
- Other Theft
- Possession/Use of drugs
- Vehicle Crime (Inc Inter.)

Comparing the number of crimes recorded in the period February 2023 vs February 2024, there were fewer of the following crime types recorded in the Borough:

- Bicycle Theft
- Other Sexual offences
- Burglary Business & Com.
- Police Generated Crime
- Public Order Offences
- Trafficking of drugs
- Possession of Weapons
- Publicly Reported Crime
- Stalking and Harassment
- Rape
- Theft from the person
- Shoplifting
- Criminal damage and Arson
- Total Crime
- Violence with injury
- Violence without injury

Compared with February 2022 – February 2023, the largest reduction in Police recorded offences in Stockton-on-Tees was in relation to 'Theft from the person' at (-41.6%).

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

As at data provided on 19/03/2024, reports of ASB to Cleveland Police show that across the Borough in the last 12 months, there was 4,850 ASB incidents, compared to 4,384 in the previous 12 months, an increase of 10.6%.

Between 19/03/2023 & 19/03/2024, 4,680 Service Requests were recorded by Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council Civic Enforcement team as ASB. This is equal to a decrease of 154 incidents (-3.2%) on the previous year.

Crime: February 2022- February 2023 versus February 2023 – February 2024

Table 1 below shows the number of crimes that have been recorded in Stockton-on-Tees between in the above titled period_and Table 2 provides a one-month snapshot of the same for the last available month (February 2024). Please note, this does not necessarily mean that the crime occurred during that month, but it is the date that the crime was reported to Cleveland Police.

Key to note in Table 1 below, between February 2023 – February 2024:

- Between February 2023 February 2024, there were 19,407 publicly reported offences, which is a decrease of -691 crimes (or -3.4%) on the same period in the previous year. The largest reduction (-41.6) in Police recorded offences in Stockton-on-Tees was in relation to Theft from the person.
- Police generated crime, which includes crimes such as drug offences, public disorder and possession of weapons has decreased by -540 crimes in comparison with the previous period, giving total police generated crime figure of 3628 offences, down -13.0% on the same period the previous year.
- Overall, there was a total of 23,035 crimes in the current period, equal to -1231 (-5.1%) less crimes in the same period last year.
- The rate per 1,000 population (all ages)² for publicly reported crime in Stockton-on-Tees was 116.9 for February 2023 to February 2024.

Key to note in Table 2 below:

- In February 2024, 1345 publicly reported offences were recorded in the Borough, which is a decrease of -360 (or -21.1%) on February 2023. The largest increase was in relation to Possession of Weapons.
- Police generated crime, which includes crimes such as drug offences, public disorder and possession of weapons was 272 in February 2024, down by (-9.9%) versus February 2023 2023. The largest decrease was in relation to Homicide & Theft from the Person.
- Overall, there was a total of 1617 crimes in the current period, equal to -390 (-19.4%) less crimes in February 2023 versus February 2024.
